Our response to increased food insecurity and the climate crisis is to create a decolonized, grassroots food system. We are tackling food insecurity while promoting engagement and deepening connections.


















2023 by the numbers

We aim to redesign the Learning Garden to return culturally and ecologically important plant species and continue our work in the Community Garden to reflect Indigenous land practices.
